Friends of Today's Music / Contemporary Music Seminar

Friends of Today's Music presents the world premiere of Derek Bermel's Four Homages for Piano on Sunday June 29 at 3:00 PM during the MTAC Convention. These four short etudes pay homage to Bermel's musical heroes: Hungarian Salsa (homage to Ligeti), La machine infernale (homage to Stravinsky), Appoggiatura (homage to Scriabin) and Instant of Blues (homage to Nancarrow). Five young pianists will premiere this new work and exchange ideas with the composer and audience. Published scores will be available at the convention.

Following the Friends of Today's Music event, Grammy award winning pianist Gloria Cheng will present a session on contemporary piano music at 5:00 PM. Join us for this adventurous afternoon of composers, new music, and exploration into unknown works.

The Contemporary Music Seminar on Monday, June 30 at 1:00 PM features students, teachers, and guest performing works of our time. Selections by Martinu, Shostakovich, Muczynski, Messiaen, Bolcom, Okamoto, and Dischel will be introduced by the performers.

Described by the Toronto Star as an "eclectic with wide open ears," Bermel's works draw from a rich variety of musical genres, including classical, jazz, pop, rock, blues, folk, and gospel. Hands-on experience with music of cultures around the world has become part of the fabric and force of his compositional language.

We look forward to Mr. Bermel's residency at convention and the premiere of his new work.

Improvisation

Monday at the Convention will be a big Improvisation Day. Just after the morning Business Meeting, the Improvisation Celebration Recitals will begin at 9:45 AM in the Carmel Room, with two more recitals at 11:00 AM and 4:00 PM. These recitals are "Celebrations of Creativity" – students recorded their improvisation, sent it in for evaluation, received a high rating on creativity and musicality, and were selected to perform in the Improvisation Celebration Recital. Each recital features a different group of students. You will hear the final result of their Improvisations in the recital. They also will play Improvisation "Games," choosing a subject out of a hat and playing a short improvisation about that subject. Each student will have a few turns at the games that are based on Haydn, Holidays, and Jungle Animals. This is quite interactive, and sometimes the audience is involved too, to give you an idea how to interact in a class setting with several students together. Bring a student along to learn and help you lead the games in your studio.

The games used in the convention recital are available at the MTAC Online Store – *Games and Activities for Improvisation*. This book has hundreds of ideas to use in Levels Prep through Advanced. The companion book, *Improvisation Syllabus and Guide* includes Improvisation assignments related more closely to technical items in CM and includes Levels Prep through Advanced. Any pages in these books may be copied and given to students for weekly Improvisation Assignments.

The **Improvisation Honors Recital** will be at 2:30 PM in the Los Angeles Room. This showcases six students who entered *two* improvisations, receiving the highest scores on both. These are the more experienced improvisers who will have longer, more developed, interesting pieces (up to 4 minutes each). After the students perform their Improvisations, the second portion of the recital features those same students as they improvise "on-the-spot" based on themes or objects <u>unknown</u> to them ahead of time — they will see the themes and objects just before they improvise. Experienced in improvising, these students will show that they can be creative and play musically on a moment's notice. You will want to see this. Bring one of your students with you who may be at the convention that day. Both of you will be inspired by the creativity of the Honors students!

Piano Concerto-Solo Competition

Northern Regionals: North Regionals this year were held on March 15, at Santa Clara University. There were 88 participants this year from 30 teachers. Forty-two percent of participating students were named as winners, alternates, or honorable mentions.

Southern Regionals: Day 1 of the Concerto-Solo Southern Regionals was held at El Camino College on Saturday, March 22. 105 students competed from 45 different teacher studios. Thirty-nine percent of the field placed, including a winner in each division, along with first and second Alternates, and Honorable Mentions.

The Convention Competition

The Solo winners in the South and North will now prepare to compete at the Convention, with the same preparations taking place for the Concerto winners in their respective categories.

This year, the Solo Finals will be held on Saturday, June 28 at 2:30 PM at the Convention. The Concerto Finals will remain in its popular time slot of Saturday evening at 7:30 PM. The playing level in every age division continues to be very high, and given the competitive nature, generates a lot of excitement in the audience. Please make every effort to attend one or both of the final rounds!

Concerto Masterclass

There is a **new Concerto Masterclass** that will be debuted at the Convention this summer. It will feature the four first alternates (North and South) from Concerto Divisions III and IV. This two-hour master class is scheduled for Saturday, June 28 at 10:00 AM in the International Ballroom. The master teacher is Julliard professor, Jerome Lowenthal. The featured piano concertos are Prokofiev, Concerto No. 3 in C (first movement), Rachmaninov, Concerto No. 2 in C minor (third movement), and Rachmaninov, Concerto No. 4 in G minor (first movement).

If you haven't attended an MTAC Convention, we have just the offer for you!

MTAC offers free Convention registration to members who have never been to Convention before. If you have never attended an MTAC State Convention and would like to this year, you may be eligible to receive a free registration from the State. Each MTAC Branch is given one free first time attendee registration and may freely decide how this member will be chosen. Take advantage of this great opportunity to attend the 2014 MTAC Convention in Los Angeles. After you have been chosen by your Branch, please register by June 15th using the First Time Attendee Form (available at the State Office). Please note that the signature of your Branch President is required. The first time attendee free registration will not be accepted on site at the convention.

In addition, we offer a great opportunity for new members. Any new branch member who was approved after August 1, 2013, can receive \$40 off the full convention registration rate. The State Office must receive this discounted convention registration application on or before June 15, 2014. This is a great opportunity for a new member to meet and network with members throughout the state. Please note that this new member discount applies to Preregistration only.

Convention Delegates

Delegates to our Convention Delegates' Meeting and Annual Business Meeting are very important. They represent every member in your Branch. Many Branches give their delegates some kind of compensation for being a delegate, i.e. free convention registration. If this is the case in your Branch, your delegates must still register as regular members and then get reimbursement from their Branch.

The regular registration prices are:

- Pre-registration: \$250 if paid before June 15, 2014
- After June 15: \$290

Program Highlights

Greetings colleagues. I must admit, I have been very pleased with the reaction to the announcement of the guest artists for our upcoming convention this summer in Los Angeles, at the LAX Hilton Hotel. In addition to the tremendous performing artists, we have a plethora of outstanding clinicians from all over the world converging to Los Angeles for our June 27-July 1 event. Including every name in this short article with a description would be very difficult, but all of the information is available on our website www.mtac.org where you can check-out the schedule more carefully, and also plan your visit!

Here are just a few of the highlights: Anderson & Roe have been making headlines for years, somewhat under the radar, until their YouTube videos starting going viral, and now millions of people know who they are and presenters around the world are clamoring to book them. Well, we got them for our Monday evening recital and they will also give a master class on Tuesday morning. Sean Chen, the \$100,000 American Pianist DeHann Classical Fellow and Cliburn Crystal Medalist will also be one of our convention artists. He will give a recital, a master class, participate in a "How to Prepare for College/Conservatory Auditions" moderated discussion, and give a teaching session for a limited and lucky number of members. Members can sign up for any of our small sessions when they register for the convention. James Walker, professor of flute at USC and his collaborative partner, Bryan Pezzone will be giving a recital and various master classes and improvisatory workshops. Aaron Blake from the Cincinnati Opera will sing a recital, and give a master class. Nathan Cole and Mitchell Newman, both violinists in the Los Angeles Philharmonic will be visiting the convention to give recitals

and master classes. Experts in their various fields will talk about the use of social media in your music studio for various purposes and the internet as a teaching tool or business advocate. We will have experienced professors speaking about the artist use of the pedal; how to play effortless trills; how to encourage and harness teenage exuberance; how to motivate your students, yourself and your parents; and teaching tips that are innovative and fun. James Ramos, Charles Asche, Fred Karpoff, Susan Bruckner, Alpha Walker and Diane Hidy. Great pianists will perform and speak about piano music for the lefthand alone, and the masterpiece by Hindemith-Ludus tonalis: Keith Snell and Charles Fierro. Lincoln Hanks, composer and theory professor from Pepperdine will share his new and interesting year-long project sponsored by the Pickford Foundation on writing new music for silent films. We will learn about the Russian pedagogical philosophy at the very early ages of study and the cognitive benefits of music study by: Katrin Arefy, Janet Stoller, and Janet Lopinski. Want to know how to establish a studio pipeline that leads to a full class, and how once you get that class how to build a community amongst the students and families. Well, attend the sessions given by Karen Wallace and Lori Bastien. Master classes continue with John Walz leading the cello class, and Diane Hidy and Nancy Bachus overseeing the intermediate piano master classes. Melody Bober will present two sessions on choosing interesting repertoire and keeping your recitals energized and interesting. The ever-popular Forrest Kinney will be highly visible with several interesting sessions during, and the Grammy Award-winning pianist Gloria Cheng will talk about unlocking the deep underpinnings of contemporary piano music. Unforgettable will be the Scriabin recital by Dmitry Rachmanov, repertoire he has played around the world during his semester sabbatical, including Moscow, Paris, Chicago, Carnegie Hall, and Prague. Dr. Rachmanov will also lead one of the advanced master classes. We are also fortunate to have pianist and world-renown teacher from Juilliard, Jerome Lowenthal, who has agreed to appear at the convention and will lead a new concerto master class. We welcome back Jade Huang and Michael **Delfin**, former YAG members and both soon-to-be Peabody graduates. They will play a duo recital and participate in the panel discussion with Sean Chen about preparing for and life at the conservatory. The panel will be moderated by APA President Joel Harrison.

Friends of Today's Music takes great pride in the premiere of the MTAC commissioned composer Derek Bermel's new work: "Four Homages for Piano. It is but one of so many performances by award-winning students and teachers. Plan to attend all of these evening performances: YAG, VOCE, and Concerto Finals. Hear much of the repertoire that is in the CM Syllabus at the many recitals taking place throughout the convention. Ron Borczon, chair of Music Therapy at Cal State University Northridge, will give a presentation on becoming a music therapist, one of the most sought-after professions within the music field. Our keynote speaker is Dr. William Brody, current president of the Salk Institute in La Jolla, a serious avocational pianist and former president of Johns Hopkins University.

Additional guest speakers will include the president of the California Arts Council, **Craig Watson**.

Louisa Wong, Page Chair, West Los Angeles Branch Convention Pages needed. Please help!

The 2014 MTAC Convention in Los Angeles (Friday, June 27 through Tuesday, July 1) at The Hilton Los Angeles Airport Hotel requires at least 200 (yes, two hundred!) pages who are responsible high school (or mature junior high) students during the Convention. Each page may serve at least a four hour shift and may invite a friend (who needs not be a music student) to join him/her. **Teachers** and parents are also encouraged to be pages, especially for evening events (including banquets and receptions) and at the practice rooms. This is an excellent opportunity for your students to be an essential part of all the wonderful events at the Convention. Your students who volunteer to serve as a page may be able to receive (upon request) a letter of recommendation that could be added to any college scholarship or job application. Student pages will also receive community service credits for this volunteering job.

Below are the different types of pages and their specific duties:

Host Page. stations at the Convention registration desk and throughout the hotel; directs/escorts Convention attendees to their destinations, answers questions, and smiles.

Event Page. picks up program. (concert, recital master class, lecture or banquet) 30 minutes prior to each event; checks event attendees' badges; passes out programs and greets event attendees; supervises entry to each event while it is in progress; opens doors at end of event; answers questions of attendees and smiles.

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
Practice Room Page. supervises practice rooms and enforces practice room schedules (Adult Pages only)

Exhibit Page. makes rounds amongst the exhibitors in the exhibit rooms; answers questions and attends to any needs of attendees and exhibitors.

The Convention is packed with events and exhibits, many of which may be of great interest to your students. Those who serve as pages may attend any Convention concert, recital, exhibit, lecture, or master class (including their accompanying parent) free of charge during the day of service. The pages will be assigned to specific days, shifts, and stations at the Convention. Please provide as many students as possible, who would be able to handle the job smoothly. Students who have applied to perform at the Convention will receive notification about their performing times with ample advanced notice so they may be able to volunteer the page's job following their performances. An orientation will be held Thursday, June 26 at 6:30 p.m. at the Hilton Los Angeles Airport Hotel, 5711 West Century Blvd., L.A. 90045
